

BURNS

(Superficial Burns)

Level I

(If subjective data sufficient, no exam is necessary.)

Skill Level: RN

Definition: Superficial burn involving epidermis only. May be caused from over exposure to the sun, heat source or chemical.

MILD	
<p>Subjective:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">• Patient will complain of pain and tenderness.• "I have a sunburn."• "I burned myself."	<p>Assessment:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">• Impaired skin integrity: superficial burn, sun exposure, heat source or chemical irritant.
<p>Objective:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">• Redness to exposed skin and tenderness to touch, no blisters. Limited to the epidermal layer. Blanching with pressure, normal skin texture intact.	<p>Plan:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">• Patient educations and self-care items for this protocol include:<ul style="list-style-type: none">--Tylenol/Aspirin 2 tabs every 4 hours.--Ibuprofen 200 mg 1-2 tabs QID.--A variety of lotions.--Skin block lotion--Chapstick Lip Balm• Cool water immersion or cool compress of affected body area.• Any eye involvement, blistering, extensive burn or if no improvement go to Level II protocol.

Patient Teaching:

1. Avoid outdoor activities between 10:00 am - 2:00 pm.
2. Warn that some drugs such as Tetracycline or psychotropic meds can cause increased susceptibility of the skin to sunburn.
3. Advise that sunscreen may be purchased and used especially during the summer months.
4. Wear protective clothing when possible.


